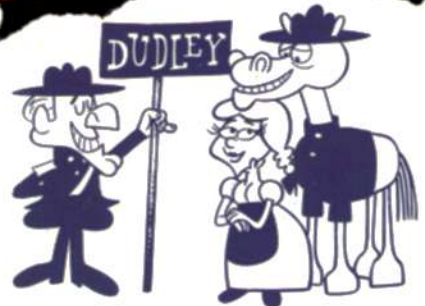

To avoid confusion with Filmation's "Ghostbusters" series based on the previously popular live-action series, the producers of this series, adapted from the hit motion picture, changed the title of their program to make sure that audiences knew the difference.

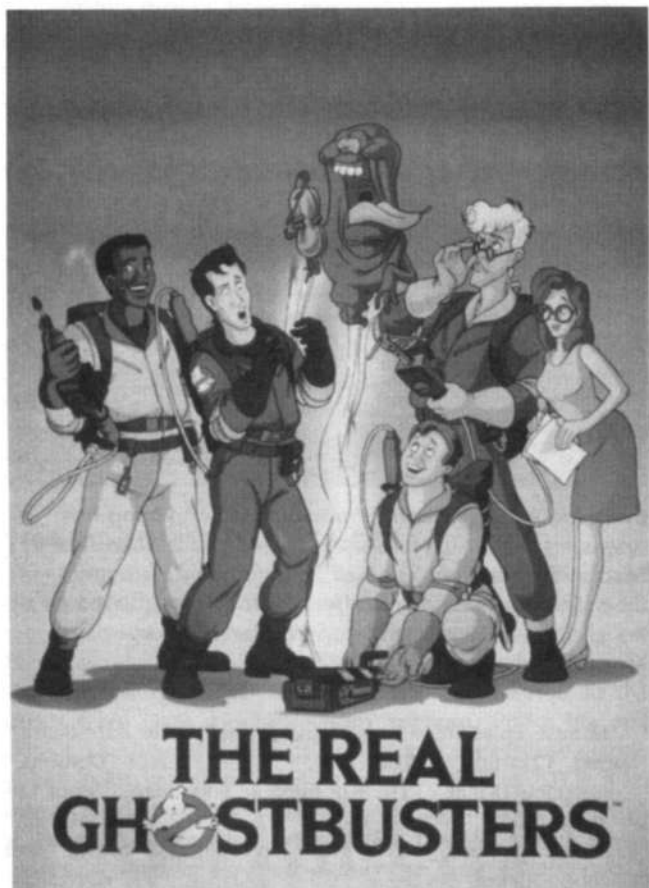
In this animated update, those three misfits who single-handedly saved New York from supernatural destruction are up to their same old tricks, keeping the city safe from demons, curses, spooks and every other off-the-wall weirdness known (and unknown) to mortal man. Premiering on ABC in 1986, the series was subsequently syndicated with all-new episodes. Ray Parker Jr.'s original hit song is featured as the program's theme song. After two successful seasons on the network, ABC commissioned a third season of shows under the title of "Slimer! The Real Ghostbusters" in 1988. *A DIC Enterprises Production. Color. Half-hour. Premiered on ABC: September 13, 1986–September 3, 1988. Syndicated.*
